Central Idea - We all mature throughout life and need to take care of ourselves as we mature.

We have been inquiring into how good relationships are an important aspect of well-being.

There were several particularly Interesting activities which we enjoyed. One involved each of us writing a letter to a teacher we were interested in talking to. We wrote and asked if they had any advice for us concerning adolescence and maintaining good relationships. This was a great opportunity for us to make another good relationship with a trusted adult. We all came back to the classroom and talked about our experiences and learned from one another.

The other activity involved watching a video about gossiping and rumors. This is always a problem for groups of students in school. The advice was simple and clear, so we took that advice and will certainly act on it. The advice was then made into posters which we put in the PY building. We thought that it was a good way of teaching others how to avoid gossiping and spreading rumors. We're also continuing with the book, 'Just between us'. it's a story about a girl who has to take control take control of her gossiping problem.



We were all fascinated when there was the opportunity to look at a real digestive system. Well, it wasn't the whole thing, but it was a pig stomach. We looked carefully with magnifying glasses and we were able to see the details and handle the stomach lining. The texture was rough.

We then used plastic Ziploc bags, crackers and liquid to try to represent how the digestive liquids deal with food in the stomach. A big focus of our learning has been on the fact that we are responsible for making good choices meal times.

It is about how children can protect them self from sexual abuse.



We also understand that talking about this topic might feel daunting. But it doesn't have to be. PANTS has been created specifically – with the help of parents and professionals – to make sure these conversations are as easy and appropriate as possible for children as young as four.

We know you might feel that your child is too young to talk about sex. And that's why PANTS never

In the first meeting of the year, the Board was inducted into how the Board operates and the duties of the Board. The Head of School then presented a report on the operations of the school for the 2018/2019 academic year. This will be finalised in a community report which will be released to all stakeholders of the school. The Board was also updated on the school's start to the year. At the meeting, the Board also formally approved the school's decision to extend into the Middle Years Programme (MYP) and to support the budget needed to support the MYP implementation at the school. We plan on requesting candidacy from the IB shortly. The Board then identified its work for the remainder of the year which includes finding new Board members and completing its technology plan amongst other things.

PTA update - Summary of meeting held on Monday 30 September

At this meeting, the school talked to parents about international mindedness and its importance as a core value for the school. International mindedness also influences our recruitment and we do not discriminate based on sex, race, colour, religion, disability, ethnic or national origins, sexual orientation or social class.

We then spoke about the upcoming safeguarding training for learners about PANTS. PANTS helps children learn about sexual abuse and how they can protect themselves from this.

Christmas is coming around fast and we spoke about some ideas for the festival. The general consensus was for this to remain a night event. If parents have any further ideas for this, please let us know as we will begin planning soon.

We reported back from the last meeting several actions taken. To address issues with changing for swimming we will move all classes to a double block after half term break. We are also finalising our school menu and have made some changes based on the voting of learners each lunchtime. Parents also asked about air purifiers, reading and reporting progress to parents in EAL.
