

Year 3 class update - Buildings and Structures



With the guidance of Mr Rick each student has been set the task of using Sketchup to draw their own home using both 3D and 2D shapes. This has been a good challenge! Another project we are working on is using the material of wood, in the form of ice block sticks, to make a model house. The students are surprising me with their creative problem solving skills. Many students are being risk takers by trying things they are not sure will work or not. Well done Year 3! 














Year 5 update - Year Five love Top Trump Cards!

Primary Years Update

Year 7 update

This week the concepts of Sustainability, Transformation and Industrialization have been the focus of our inquiry. We have been inquiring into what exactly minerals are, how they are mined and what properties some very common ones have. As we come to understand more about mining we realise that the question of sustainability arises. Large areas of the natural environment are being destroyed, both here in Udon Thani and further afield







In mathematics we have been focusing on properties and mental strategies for addition and subtraction. We have also begun to look at using formal methods of addition with integers and decimals. The students have been working with number lines, column addition, bar modelling, part-whole models and using tables to retrieve information to solve problems.

Modern languages - English as an Additional Language (EAL)

We had so many stories to share from our Christmas vacations. So, we created our own holiday booklets from scrap paper to showcase our best moments and experiences. This was an amazing way to slowly ease us back to our daily school routines and help the environment. We had lots of practise asking and answering questions and we got really creative in designing the front cover. Our EAL learners in KS1 used pictures to help them with their writing and KS2 used the simple past tense to write about their holiday adventures.





















Health and Safety- Monkeys

Last week we had a visit from a monkey. It was not a time when many students were around. The monkey walked around the perimeter wall of the school and disappeared. We have instructed the learners about what to do if they should meet this or other monkeys during the course of the day at school. Perhaps our parents could talk to their children about how to behave if they should ever meet a monkey and about ways to stay safe in this situation.



Inquiry corner

What do inquiry teachers do?

The teacher talks less. The learners talk more. That's because deeper understanding grows as a learner tries to explain what is in their head.

Teachers ask 'rich' questions. The conversations in an inquiry classroom are rich with quality questions – inquiry teachers know how to use questions to help students uncover their own thinking and understanding.

Teacher captures the learner's heart. We know what our learners love and we relate our lessons to those things that interest the children.

Teachers teach how to learn. We can't possibly know everything, and so we too are still learning. We lead the learners in how they can learn by themselves

A big part of the inquiry approach is learning how to learn.

School board update - Summary of meeting held on Friday 22 November

The school operates a school board which oversees how the school is operated and makes decisions on policy, fees and budgets. The parent volunteers role is to look out for the interests of parents on the school board so that the Board can consider the interests of parents when it makes decisions.

In the second meeting of the year, the Board completed the appraisal of the Head of School for the 2018/2019 academic year and set targets for the 2019/2020 academic year. The Board then discussed strategy and planning for next year that would inform the approval of the new school budget for 2020/2021. The Board believed we needed to do better in marketing the benefits of the school to parents and suggested a regular climate survey to gauge parent perceptions. The Board also confirmed the plan to proceed step by step until the Diploma Programme (DP) which provides options for parents to continue with our style of learning until the end of high school. The Board then identified its work for the remainder of the year which includes finding new Board members and completing its technology plan amongst other things.

The next Board meeting is planned for Friday 21 February.







PTA update - Summary of meeting held on Monday 11 November

At this meeting, we spoke to parents about the results from the food survey. The school highlighted some of the main findings. Of these, 54% of parents were satisfied with the catering while 46% of parents were not. The school suggested that it could provide a food stall at the Christmas event for parents to try the school's food. The school can also provide a trial lunch for parents to come and try the food too.

การประชุมครั้งนี้เราพูดคุยกันถึงเรื่องผลการสำรวจเรื่องอาหาร ทางโรงเรียนได้นำผลการสำรวจบางข้อที่สำคัญ คือ ผลการ สำรวจ 54% ของผู้ปกครอง พึงพอใจกับการให้บริการอาหารของโรงเรียน ส่วนอีก 46% ของผู้ปกครอง ไม่พึงพอใจกับการ ให้บริการอาหารของโรงเรียน ทางโรงเรียนจึงเสนอท่านผู้ปกครองว่า ในวันคริสต์มาสที่จะถึงนี้ ทางโรงเรียนจะจัดอาหาร บางอย่างที่อยู่ในเมนูอาหารกลางวันของนักเรียน ให้ท่านผู้ปกครองได้ชิมในวันงาน และทางโรงเรียนยังเสนอให้ท่านผู้ปกครอง เข้ามาทดลองชิมอาหารกลางวันได้ด้วยเช่นกัน

The second issue was around the opt-out option. 40% of parents surveyed said that they would like the ability to opt-out from the food fee. The school asked what this might mean to parents as this would mean they would have to provide their own lunch and snacks. Parents expressed some uncertainty about this and asked to query other parents. Parents suggested looking at the balance of foods as the vegetarian option did not seem popular, and surveying the popularity of the sandwich and salad bars.

ประเด็นที่ 2 คือ ผลการสำรวจ 40% ของผู้ปกครอง ต้องการให้โรงเรียนยกเลิกการให้บริการอาหาร นั่นหมายถึงท่าน ผู้ปกครองจะต้องเตรียมเบรคเช้า, อาหารกลางวัน และ เบรคบ่าย มาเอง ผู้ปกครองบางท่านไม่แน่ใจเกี่ยวกับเรื่องเปอร์เซ็นที่ สำรวจได้ ผู้ปกครองจึงอาสาขอไปสอบถามผู้ปกครองท่านอื่นๆ อีกครั้ง ผู้ปกครองแนะนำให้โรงเรียนดูเรื่องความสมดุลเรื่อง อาหารมังสวิรัติ เพราะผลการสำรวจอาหารมังสวิรัติไม่ค่อยเป็นที่นิยมมากนัก และยังมีการสอบถามเกี่ยวกับความนิยมของสลัด บาร์ และแซนวิชบาร์

The school then outlined changes it was making to the end of term report cards. These are intended to simplify reports and convey information more easily to parents.

จากนั้นทางโรงเรียนได้มีการอธิบายเพิ่มเติมเกี่ยวกับการเปลี่ยนแปลงการรายงานผลการเรียนนักเรียน จุดประสงค์เพื่อลด ความซับซ้อน และสามารถสื่อสารให้ผู้ปกครองเข้าใจได้ง่ายขึ้น

Next, the PTA discussed the Christmas event. It was decided that an event that started from 5pm onwards was desirable. The school asked if parents were interested in setting up a food booth and parents agreed to follow up on this.

ต่อมาได้พูดคุยถึงเรื่องงานวันคริสต์มาส ผู้ปกครองส่วนใหญ่ประสงค์ให้งานเริ่มห้าโมงเย็นเป็นต้นไป ทางโรงเรียนยังได้ สอบถามผู้ปกครองถึงความสนใจในการตั้งแผงขายอาหารด้วยเช่นกัน

For sports day, we invited suggestions from parents. Parents suggested that separate EY and PY events could be difficult to organise. They suggested holding them on one day and integrating them as much as possible.

สำหรับงานกีฬาโรงเรียน เรียนเชิญผู้ปกครองทุกท่านเข้าร่วมงาน ผู้ปกครองบางท่านเสนอว่า การแยกกิจกรรมระหว่าง แผนกอนุบาล และประถม อาจจะทำให้เกิดความยุ่งยากในการจัดการ ผู้ปกครองจึงเสนอแนะว่าควรจัดในวันเดียวกัน และจัด ร่วมกันจะดีกว่า

Lastly, the school reported on actions from the last meeting. The school has added air purifiers to all homerooms and a central AQI chart for parents to monitor. The school has also added portion plates as a plating option for learners at lunchtimes. Lastly, the school has invested heavily in replacing its WIFI network to support the 1:1 programme and the general use of technology within the school. Parents commented that for AQI inside days, this information should still be conveyed to parents before school starts.

้ หัวข้อสุดท้าย ทางโรงเรียนได้รายงานผลความคืบหน้าจากการประชุมครั้งที่แล้ว ทางโรงเรียนได้ติดตั้งเครื่องฟอกอากาศใน ห้องเรียนทุกห้องเรียบร้อยแล้ว และมีบอร์ดแสดงค่าอากาศทุกๆเช้าๆ รวมถึงทางโรงเรียนได้เพิ่มตัวเลือกของชนิดถาดอาหาร รวมถึงถาดหลุมให้เป็นตัวเลือกสำหรับนักเรียนด้วยเช่นกัน สุดท้ายโรงเรียนได้ปรับเปลี่ยนสัญญาณอินเตอร์เน็ตให้ดีขึ้น เพื่อรองรับโปรแกรม 1:1 ผู้ปกครองแนะนำให้ทางโรงเรียนแจ้งค่า ⊢QI ลงในไลน์กลุ่มผู้ปกครอง เพื่อแจ้งให้ผู้ปกครองรับทราบว่า ควรใส่หน้ากากอนามัยมาโรงเรียนหรือไม่
